IN THE CITY OF SULTAN MUHAMMAD FATEH

AN EXCERPT FROM THE DIARY OF SIDIO AKBAR, A MEDICAL STUDENT FROM PAKISTAN, PARTICIPANT OF THE FIMA YOUTH CAMP ISTANBUL-2017.

On Sunday 17th July, we arrived at the Ataturk Airport, Istanbul to represent PIMA (Pakistan Islamic Medical Association) in FIMA Youth Summer Camp, arranged for 400 delegates of almost 30 countries. I was so excited to visit Turkey, Thanks God, my dream came true. The camp for male students was located in Tuzla, named as SEHIT OMER HALISDEMIR CAMP. The Male Camp was on the Asian part of Istanbul at a distance of 2 hours from Ataturk airport. On the way to camp we could see the beautiful and historic city, having high rise and historical buildings, wide open roads with sides decorated with flowers and giant bridges especially the SULTAN MAHMET FATEH BRIDGE over the Bosporus has its own fame. We reached the camp while enjoying the beautiful scenery, here we were welcomed by organizers of the camp. A bag containing a pen, notebook and badge of camp, cap and a shirt was gifted to us. The shirt and cap were a kind of uniform for the Camp. Right in front of the entrance in the center of the camp was refractory. Midway to refractory on the right side was Matrak Arena and behind this area there were sites for games like wall climbing, tree-top adventure and archery. The path behind the refractory lead to football and volleyball grounds. And next to it was a small mosque, the table tennis and chessboard were also provided. The washrooms were located on both sides of the entrance gate. We were shown our rooms. Students in each room were from different countries, organizers did it on purpose so that we can interact with different people and make new friends. We were organized into groups. Each group had a 'Group Leader' and consisted of students from 3 rooms. Group leaders were members of the organizing committee. A total of 10 groups were made.

On Monday 17th July, our camp







officially started with Fajar prayer followed by a brief nap and then we were served our first Turkish breakfast in the Refractory having Turkish Tea, cheese, butter, egg, honey, orange juice, tomato and cucumber. Turkish Tea was available all the time in the camp. The opening ceremony started at 9am in the refractory. Dr. Prof. Ihsan Karaman, vice President of FIMA, gave the welcome speech. He introduced us to the Hayat foundation, our sponsors for the camp. In the opening Ceremony, the Mayor Sadi Yazici of Istanbul joined us. After lunch, we prayed Zuhur in the refractory. Seminar started soon after lunch. Prof. Atallah Alruhaily of the Department of Medicine (Saudi Arabia) talked about "FIMA: Past, Present, Future". That how was its past? What is it doing presently? And what is its vision for future?

Next seminar was about "Role of Young Muslim Health Professional in Their Communities Health







Promotion". This topic was elaborated by Prof. Dr. Musa Mohd Nordin (Malaysia). At 3 pm we entered the most exciting segment of the camp. The segment of Sports and Arts. Sports like Paintball, Wall Climbing, Table tennis, Orienteering, Chess, Archery, Mangala, Matrak, Mas Wrestling, Treetop Adventure Course and Volleyball, while in Arts Folk Dance and Calligraphy were a part of this exciting segment. Mangala is a famous game of Turkey. Its 3000 years old game. Matrak is traditional sports in Turkey. Later folk dance that was used to be performed by students from different countries, introduced to us different cultural dance that exist around the globe. Saudi Arabian, Turkish, Lebanese, Pakistani (Baloch), Sudanic, Bangladeshi and Kurd showed their talent in folk dance. A professional calligrapher was sitting in a corner of the refractory. He was showing his class with different kinds of pencils and pens. He was writing on charts,







key chains, diaries, and many other items. After a while we headed to the football ground to pray and to attend the brain storming session thereafter. Each group sat in a shape of circle. We played a game to remember the names. A ball was used. A friend will throw the ball to other friend and he has to tell the name of the friend who threw the ball to him and it goes on till the last person in the circle. If someone fails to recall the name he had to do "Pushups" as a punishment. We also talked about our traditions and cultures, famous things in our countries especially food. This session continued till midnight then we prayed for Isha.

Day 2 (Camp) the first seminar was about "Founding Principles of Islamic Civilization". This topic was highlighted by Professor of Philosophy Ihsan Fazlioglu (Turkey). At 10 am "Country Presentations" started. In this session presentations were given by students from each country about the IMAs (Islamic Medical Associations) in their country. So, we came to know about







different IMAs, and their services to humanity. In the second seminar, the lecture was delivered by Assistant Professor Ahmet Okumus, department of Political Science and IR (Turkey). His topic was "Islamic Thoughts from Past to Future". It was prayer and lunch time. Everyone was hungry. The aroma and sight of 'fried chicken' was so exciting. A few minutes later we heard an announcement, this was to leave the refractory in 5 minutes. We didn't care about the announcement as there was no scheduled activity before 3 pm. But as 5 minutes warning time was over, we heard the organizer again saying "I request the brothers outside the refractory to fire at those who are inside the refractory enjoying their meal." "Run bro, run! Run!" one of the friend shouted. The friends outside were carrying water guns and were aiming and throwing water shower at us. I forgot about my meal and abruptly ran out. I guess, I barely had a step out of the refractory that I was hit by a balloon full of water. It was slightly painful, but the bad part was my clothes were soaked in water.







Where to go! No place to hide as all the camp was covered by this army of "water gun squad". An idea came to my mind and I started making video. There it is, now nobody was chasing me. After a while I grab one gun and it was my turn to take a revenge and started hunting. It was one of the memorable moments of the camp. That day the "Brain Storming" session was about the 'Problems of Muslim Youth.' Each group had to list the problems that young Muslims Ummah are facing. Every member actively participated in this session. Each friend explained his views according to his own perceptions. Problems are many unfortunately. But we were short of time and had to Pray Isha prayer and sleep. It's enough for the day.

Day 3 (Camp) "waakeuppp...... Brother wake up.... oooooo !!!aaaaaaaa!!!" I was awakened by this sweet echoing sound of our Turkish brother. That is how they used to wake us up for Fajar Prayer. As usual we had our breakfast and "Country Presentations" started.







After this there was a workshop on "Leadership". The guest speaker was Dr. Basil Alshaikh (Saudi Arabia). Second seminar's topic was "Addiction among Youth: Role of Muslim Health Professional", by Ph.D. Dr. Ahmet Zaki Olas (Turkey). At 11 pm we gathered Matrak arena. This was the time for "Personal Talent Shows". Musical Chair, Balloon Blowing Game, Folk Dance and Eating Competition were held. Camp has its own charm and beauty when it's time to light the 'Camp Fire.' When the wooden planks were given fire, the whole camp was glowing. FIMA YOUTH written with wires covered with wool between two trees, was also lightening.

Day 4 (Camp and Bosphorus Trip) Today I had my breakfast early and went to my room to put my belongings in my bags. We packed our stuff and got ready as these were our last moments in the camp. Country Presentations started in a while. Then last lunch of the camp was served. After having meal, we gathered in the Matrak arena for instructions from organizers and for Group Photo. It was almost 5 pm when we got in the buses and headed towards Bosporus. It is the narrowest waterway that connects the Asian and European sides of Istanbul. Bosporus is a connection between Black Sea and Sea of Marmara. It is one of the beautiful tourist spot one can find in the city. As soon as we reached Bosporus we got in a Sea Cruise and started sailing in the water. From the cruise, you can see both sides of the sea and city.

At last after so many day of abstinence from the cellular phone activity, free Wi-Fi was available in the hostel. A new life was running in all of us, the deprived ones!!! It's



enough for today. Good Night!

Day 5 (Istanbul Tour and Gala Dinner)

Today our plan was to see Hagia Sofia, Topkapi Palace and Blue Mosque. These historic masterpiece were at a distance of half an hour from our hostels near the Bosporus.

Hagia Sofia was a great place to see. Both Islamic and Christian art and remains can be seen there. We prayed Jumma Prayer in famous and historic Sultan Ahmet Mosque or the Blue Mosque. After enjoying our lunch on benches in front of Blue Mosque, the organizers gave us time to go to the bazar and have some shopping the buses took us to Dolmabache Palace after taking a short rest in our hostel. We came to know that Respected President of Turkey, Recep Tayyep Erdogan was also coming to grace the occasion with his presence in the Gala Dinner. It seemed incredible, it was our dream, we were still not believing this, are we really going to see him with our eyes? We reached Dolmabache Palace at evening, all dressed up according to our traditions, I was wearing my traditional attire. The dinner was ready, we had our meal. At 8.30 pm President Erdogan entered the Palace in his car with his security and protocol. He met with FIMA and Hayat Foundation Members and had dinner with them. The program on Health in Africa started, the officials welcomed President Erdogan and requested him to come to the stage for his speech. He started his speech, he talked about Turkey's contribution and help to African countries, he stressed on unity of Muslim countries and he also talked about the recent brutal acts of Israel in the Gaza and Al-Aqsa, and reaffirmed that



Muslims of Palestine that they are not alone. After President speech, a family photo was taken, some friends were lucky to shake hands with him and make a selfie with him. President Erdogan left the palace in his car, I managed to make a small video of him while he was waving at us. It was the happiest moment of my life, I I cannot find words to express my contentment and gratitude.

Day 6 (Istanbul Meeting)

We reached the beautiful building of Federal Directorate of State Archives at 8 am. We were again separated into new groups, there were 18 groups for male and female, each with one group leader. The main aim of today's meeting was Crisis management and project development. The sessions were highly informative, we learned a lot. "Report Session" was held in Auditorium. Which was presentation of Brainstorming sessions of male and female camps. At the end certificates were awarded to all participants. Group photo of male and female were taken, and then a family photo of all participant was taken.

For me and of course everyone, the hard time was to say good-bye to the friends we made at camp, the love we shared, the moments and the fun we had at camp. All these thoughts were carrying me here and there, I could not control my tears and similarly no one could. Even I cannot write these lines without tears in my eye, it reminds me all my sweet friends, their smiles and their love. It was like two real brothers separating for the rest of their lives. The bond was basically because of Islam, and the credit goes to FIMA and Hayat Foundation Turkey, they gathered youth of Ummah and made them feel united.

forces and extremists in Burma trying to eliminate the Rohingya Muslim population driven out of their homelands. The FIMA partners including Islamic Medical Association of Malaysia (IMAM) and ourother partners in the ASEAN and SAARC region regularly runs clinics and charitable activities to cater for the health and welfare of the Rohingya refugees since so many years.

We therefore feel compelled to voice our concern regarding the recent escalation of killings of the Rohingyas in Rakhine state, Myanmar. About 400-3000 innocent men, women and children have been reported killed in the past week. 10 thousand homes and shops were burnt and destroyed by the Burmese military. Women and children have drowned trying to cross the river Naaf into Bangladesh. The ongoing violence against the Rohingyas is totally unacceptable by any standards of humanity.

The Rohingyas have been living in the Rakhine (Arakan) state of Myanmar for generations and centuries but have effectively been rendered stateless, with absolutely no rights in their country of birth.

Human Rights Watch in its 2013 report and the UN Refugee Agency UNHCR called on the Myanmar government to end the ethnic cleansing of the Rohingyas.

The Secretary General of the UN on 1 September 2017 urged restraint and calm to avoid a humanitarian catastrophe in Rakhine following the security operations by the Burmese military.

The following day, the UN's World Food Program suspended its activities of providing food aid to the Internally Displaced Rohingyas due to the increasing violence.


For the sake of basic human rights, decency and dignity, the Islamic Medical Association of Malaysia and our health and medical partners in the ASEAN region; call upon the:

1. The Myanmar government to allow aid and relief workers to be immediately dispatched to the areas affected by the conflict, to assume their work without fear of violence.

- 2. Nobel Laureate, Aung Sang SuuKyi's civilian government to live up to the basic values of peace, justice and humanity towards the Rohingyas in Myanmar as Alfred Nobel willed, "... the abolition or reduction of standing armies and for the holding and promotion of peace congresses."
- 3. The Myanmar government to work closely with her ASEAN neighbours to resolve the Rohingya crisis amicably and peacefully as "ASEAN Spirit Soar Above All Frailties And Boundaries, ASEAN Spirit Roar Against Wars, Pests and Miseries"
- 4. All ASEAN countries to allow in and provide temporary shelter to the Rohingya refugees as "ASEAN Spirit Leads Us To Justice, And the Common Good Transforms Us, Into Grains To Feed, Steel To Build ..."



Abstract Submissions

- The 1st APIPEC Conference Scientific Committee invites abstracts of original papers covering any topic in interprofessional education and collaborative practice.
- Papers may include original researches (comprehensive or pilot studies), research reviews, case studies, educational techniques, program summary, and so on. Papers will be presented either in the form of an oral or poster presentation, depending on the preference of the authors and the decision by the 1st APIPEC Conference Scientific Committee.
- All abstracts must be submitted and presented in English.

Eligibility

• Anyone interested in participating in the session are welcome to apply.

How to Submit an Abstract




