# FIMA - WAMY MEDICAL STUDENT'S CAMP ATTRACTS STUDENT'S FROM ALL OVER THE GLOBE IN MOMBASA, KENYA

From August 2nd to 6th, 2025, students from around the world gathered in Mombasa, Kenya, for the 23rd WAMY International Camp for Medical Students, under the theme "Medicine through Time: An Islamic Perspective – Past, Present, and Future." Organized by IMAKSA and KAMMP, the camp provided participants with a unique blend of spiritual growth, medical education, and cultural exchange. Over five days, students participated in lectures, workshops, field trips, community service, and social activities, forming bonds that eclipsed borders and backgrounds.

#### **Spiritual Beginnings and Daily Reflection**

Each day of the camp began with Fajr prayer and the recitation of the Qur'an, fostering a spiritual and reflective tone. Participants also had after-salah khutbahs, moments to pause and internalize the lessons of faith and ethics. These routines helped ground the students throughout a hectic week of lectures, community service, and travel. The spiritual environment created a sense of unity among participants. Supervisors also noted the dedication of students not only to learning but uplifting one another. One participant from Uganda reflected: "My greatest motivation from this camp was the dedication of Renad Aldaheem to ensure we all benefited from the Khutbahs."

#### Lectures, Workshops, and Academic Exchange

The camp featured engaging lectures and workshops exploring the intersection



of Islamic ethics and modern medicine. Topics ranged from bioethics and jurisprudential applications in medical practice to innovation and shaping the future of medicine. These sessions encouraged critical thinking and reflection, bridging centuries of knowledge with contemporary

medical practice. The scientific program left a strong impression on participants. As one of the Saudi Arabian attendees stated: "Among the highlights was "The History of Islamic Medicine", which shed light on the remarkable contributions of Muslim physicians to the advancement of medical

knowledge worldwide, and how they served as a bridge of science across centuries."

Student chapter presentations allowed participants to showcase research, initiatives, and creative approaches to medical challenges. Supervisors were impressed by the

























engagement and enthusiasm:

"Each one of you brought something unique: your smiles, your energy, your ideas, your kindness. You've given us hope that the future of this Ummah is in strong, capable, and sincere hands."

Students left the lectures inspired, often reflecting on personal growth beyond medical knowledge. One

remarked, "Seeing non-Arabic speakers recite Qur'an beautifully inspired me to stop making excuses and start improving my own connection to Allah and knowledge."































## Community Service and Real-World Impact

A fundamental part of the camp was community service, where students applied lessons in ethics and compassion to real-world settings. Participants worked closely with local communities, offering health awareness initiatives, education, and support. These interactions emphasized humility, empathy, and the transformative power of giving.

A supervisor shared: "Wallah, it was hard to tell who came from where – you were all like one family, united by La ilaha illallah Muhammadur Rasulullah." The shared experiences in community service reminded participants that medicine is not only a profession but a tool for serving humanity with integrity and faith.

## Cultural Exchange and Social Activities

Evenings were committed to cultural exchange and social activities, offering moments of relaxation, laughter, and brotherhood. Saudi Culture Night, international presentations, and village retreat games created bonds that transcended nationalities. One student reflected: "Truly, I have gained amazing friends who are unique and rare to have in life, and that is a precious Rizq. Thank you all for every effort you've made and every moment you've shared."





Students shared their traditions, foods, and stories. Cultural activities were more than entertainment; they were opportunities to learn from one another and celebrate the diversity and unity of the Ummah. Another reflection highlighted the lasting impact: "The interesting thing about FIMA's programs and those participating is that you are all courageous! You live with people you've never met every minute for a week, share personal stories, and then part ways. Yet, we still take the call and form lifelong memories."

## Field Trips, Exploration, and Nature

Expeditions to the Mwaluganje Elephant Sanctuary, Kongo Masjid, and surrounding villages added an experiential dimension to learning. Students enjoyed historical tours, hiking, and wildlife observation, combining environmental awareness with cultural appreciation. These trips offered moments of reflection and awe, reminding students of the beauty of creation and ingraining the seed of tafakur.

#### **Reflections and Lasting Bonds**

The 23rd WAMY International Camp was more than activities, lectures, and sightseeing; it was an odyssey of spiritual growth, self-discovery, and lifelong friendships. Participants





conveyed gratitude for the generosity of the supervisors, the tireless efforts of the organizers, and the warmth of fellow students. Supervisors reflected: "From the bottom of our hearts, Jazakumullahu Khayran for giving us the honour of hosting you. You brought far more warmth into our hearts than we could ever give you."

Students also underlined the personal transformations they underwent: "A little note: any habit developed during these days, even Qur'an reading or reflecting on the Sunnah, will make a huge impact in life. You are role models wherever you go." As the camp concluded with farewells, prayers, and closing ceremonies, participants departed with strengthened faith, hearts full of gratitude, and renewed commitment to serve their communities with compassion, knowledge, and integrity.

## The bonds grew stronger... Only to face farewell

Before arriving, I had no clear picture of Mombasa. But from the very first moment, my Kenyan roommate erased all uncertainty with her warm smile and hospitality. Suddenly, I was under one roof with strangers-sharing rooms, stories, and laughter. It may seem difficult at first, but the barriers quickly faded, and bonds of love and culture were built. And just as they grew stronger, it was already time to say goodbye.

## When you give... You realize how much you have received

One of the most profound moments came during community service. On the first day, we visited a mosque where the children were orphans. Their joy and anticipation were touching, yet I walked away more grateful than ever, realizing how many blessings we live with but often overlook. We gave them simple activities and games, but they gave us powerful lessons in contentment and simplicity.

On the second day, we served a high school by offering six different services: vision screening, vital signs checks, first aid training, health consultations, and lifestyle awareness. Here, I discovered that the emotional impact far outweighed the material one; the students were eager for advice and guidance, and I felt grateful to share what I knew.





## In circles of remembrance... The heart and mind unite

After every prayer, we gathered to reflect on the sermon and connect it to our day's experiences. These were true circles of remembrance, drawing us closer to God and one another. For five days, we were enriched with powerful lectures linking medicine and Islam, focusing on ethics and correct practices. Each speaker brought unique expertise, turning the lecture hall into a window to the wider world.

## When nature opens... So do our souls

Two days were dedicated to sports along the Indian Ocean. Between white sands and blue waters, we played sports, rode camels, swam, and drank fresh coconut water. Another day was devoted to sightseeing, giving us a glimpse into the lives of local villagers. I will never forget "Manhattan Family," a woman who shared her story of embracing Islam after leaving Catholicism. Despite limited means, she raised seven children on her small farm, determined to provide them with both food and education. From her, I realized that success is not about having easy circumstances, but about overcoming the hard ones.

## Life doesn't wait... So why should we?

At first, there was hesitation. People





came from vastly different backgrounds, and starting conversations wasn't easy. The first days felt slow, but just as I began to feel at ease, it was already time to part ways. Life gives us fleeting moments filled with knowledge, experiences, and connections—but they don't last. To truly make the most of them, being present isn't enough; we must be open, willing, and ready to step outside our comfort zones. The advice for anyone joining such an experience is simple: live it from the very first moment. Speak, listen, share, ask, and dive in. Don't let shyness or hesitation hold you back. Life won't pause until you're ready, and opportunities, once gone, may never return.

## Travel, and you will find what you lost in farewell

Just five days were enough to change so much within me. I learned that every person is an open book, and that learning doesn't stop in classrooms—it continues through hearts and relationships. As the verse says: Travel, and you will find what you lost in farewell... Strive, for the sweetness of life lies in striving. And perhaps the most valuable lesson I carried home is this: "Opportunities don't wait—neither should you."


